Our Vision

A society where everybody is free to live without the threat of sexual violence

Our Mission and Values

Our mission is to be the centre of excellence in Ayrshire providing first class sexual violence and prevention education whilst supporting anybody who has experienced any type of sexual violence at any time.

We will do this in a way that is consistent with our core values:

Compassionate

- Empathetic and understanding: We recognise the trauma survivors have experienced and providing support without judgment.
- Patient and supportive: we provide survivors with the time and space they need to heal, and offer a safe and confidential space to share their experiences.

Inclusive

- Welcoming and supportive. We
 want The STAR Centre to reflect
 the population of Ayrshire and seek
 to support black and minoritised
 communities, people with disabilities,
 people of all ages, sexual orientations,
 gender identities, women involved
 with selling/exchanging sex and rural
 and remote communities including
 our island communities on Arran and
 Cumbrae.
- Cultural sensitivity: we recognise and respect the diverse backgrounds and experiences of survivors.
- As an organisation we are transinclusive, and pro-choice





Ethical

- Trauma-informed approach: All staff are trained in understanding the impact of trauma and how it can affect survivors, so they can provide appropriate support.
- Maintaining confidentiality: we maintain the highest standards of confidentiality to protect survivors' privacy and safety.
- Avoiding harmful practices: we will never engage in practices that could retraumatise survivors
- Reflective: we recognise that learning as an organisation is an on-going process and welcome challenge and feedback from all staff and stakeholders.

Survivor-focused

- Empowering survivors: We recognise that survivors are the experts in their own lives and provide them with resources and support they need to make their own choices about their healing and recovery.
- Listening to survivors' voices: we listen to survivors' experiences and perspectives, and ensure they are involved in the development of services.
- Awareness: we are working to embed an intersectional approach, recognising the compounding inequalities and discrimination that survivors and our staff may experience and seeking to reflect this in our service provision and broader work.

Feminist

- Challenging patriarchy: We believe that sexual violence is a cause and consequence of women's unequal status in a patriarchal society.
- Women-only spaces: We provide women-only services and space for women's voices to be heard (whilst being proud to support other gender identities).
- Challenging systems: We work to challenge attitudes, beliefs and systems that normalise and perpetuate rape culture and sexual violence.





Our Core Services

Prevention and Education

National Prevention Project


We deliver Rape Crisis Scotland's prevention programme across North, South and East Ayrshire.

Young people often tell us of sexual violence they experience in many areas of their lives – in relationships, peer groups, homes, education and work, on and offline.

Increasingly they tell us that sexual harassment, intimate image abuse, sexual assault and other forms of sexual violence are a problem.

These issues sit at the heart of our conversations with young people, which also create opportunities to let them know how they can access support if they need it, and that they're not alone.

ESAS

Equally Safe at School (ESAS) is a whole school intervention which aims to positively influence the school culture by fostering a shared, consistent, preventative approach to gender-based violence.

The intervention comprises six key parts; whole school assessments, a pupil-led action group, staff training, policy development, curricular enhancement and a pupil-led school campaign.

At The STAR Centre we support schools whilst they are implementing the ESAS programme and train the teachers on gender based violence in preparation.

Training

We offer training to businesses and other agencies on the following subjects:

- Understanding Sexual Violence in Society
- Responding to a disclosure of Sexual Violence
- Supporting a survivor of Sexual Violence
- Introduction to Protective Behaviours

We can also work with organisations to bespoke training to their specific needs around any issues relating to gender-based violence.

Our training is delivered by qualified educators and sexual violence experts, ensuring a top quality training experience delivered in an ethical and trauma-informed way.

Advocacy Services

Our specialist Rape Crisis Advocacy Workers help survivors to access justice. We provide support and information at every stage of the criminal justice system, from before a statement is made through to the resolution of a court case. We can help to get updates on the progress of a case, provide information about special measures, and attend court with survivors. Advocacy Workers can also provide emotional support throughout the process and after court is finished.



| The highly qualified staff at The STAR centre: Rape Crisis Ayrshire offer specialist therapeutic and emotional support and psychosocial education to survivors of any type of sexual violence in a safe, non-judgemental space. Whether it happened in the past or more recently, we help survivors understand what they are going through and support them in finding ways to cope and move forward. | We support children and young people to deal with trauma as a result of sexual violence whether that happened recently or in the past. The content of the sessions is adapted to be age specific. These sessions can take place at a child's school or in The STAR Centre and we will work with the young person to tailor the content of the sessions to their specific needs. | We support family members of people who have experienced any type of sexual violence. We offer monthly group sessions for parents across Ayrshire supporting a child who has experienced sexual abuse. In North Ayrshire we offer a full family support service for young people and their families as they recover from sexual abuse. |
| Survivors are initially offered nine, fortnightly sessions, each lasting up to 50 minutes. After this time, if longer-term support is needed, we will talk to the survivor about their options. These sessions can be online, via telephone or face to face and we will work with the survivor to tailor the content of the sessions to their specific needs. | We currently support children aged 13+ but hope to be able to extend our provision to younger children within the next two years. | |
